

Handwriting & Spelling	<p>Handwriting - Joining from an 'o' – watch this clip for more help: https://youtu.be/GkCbuNZ67vk</p> <p>Practice this join in these words: <i>ou, out, mouth, south</i></p> <p>Spelling rule - The /n/ sound is spelt kn and (less often) gn at the beginning of some words.</p> <p><i>knock, know, knee, gnat, gnaw</i></p> <p>Practise writing these words. Can you think of any more words that follow this same pattern?</p>
Writing	<p>Click here to see a lesson input: https://youtu.be/ruufZJYk5wl</p> <p>Dinosaur poetry, using alliteration. You are going to use the sentences that you wrote yesterday to make the middle part of your poem. You need to write a sentence at the beginning and at the end to finish your poem off.</p> <p>Poem starting sentence- Try to create a bit of mystery and excitement. Think about where your dinosaur might be living. You could start it like this <i>If you go down to the swamp today, be careful...</i> or <i>If you hear a noise rumbling through the forest, watch out</i> ...</p> <p>The ... are called ellipses and they are there to create suspense.</p> <p>When you have written your starting sentence add your 3 alliteration sentences.</p> <p>Then think of a final sentence; a question would be good. Here are some examples: <i>Did you see it?</i> <i>Did you hear it?</i> <i>What was that?</i></p> <p>Read your poem to someone in your family.</p>
Reading	<p>Spend some time reading either to yourself, a sibling, a pet, a cuddly toy or an adult at home.</p> <p>When you have finished have a go at this activity:</p>

	<p><i>Draw a picture to show the setting of the story or something you have learnt if it's a non-fiction book.</i></p>
